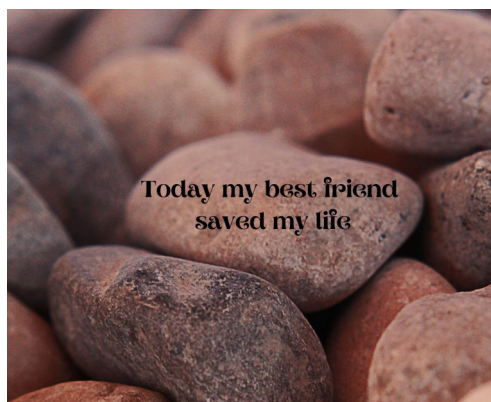

Infant Virtual Programming?

For the last two years, we as educators were given the challenge to think outside the box from traditional in-person programming to strictly virtual. For the most part, most of us including the children adapted well, but what about those babies who were too young to use technology to participate in activities?



Hello! I live in a small farming community in Northern Ontario, Canada called Temiskaming Shores. In the last few years we have seen a rise in new young families moving to this area either for work or to escape the hustle and bustle of the city life and to enjoy a much slower and less hectic lifestyle. Many of those families have relied on our programs to meet other families with similar interests and children with similar ages.

I wanted to give a chance to those moms who felt isolated at home with their newborns and toddlers to have some social time, meet other moms that were experiencing the same thing as they were and to come on a virtual platform and do an activity with their little ones and have a chance to meet and get to know us as educators and also to give a chance to those

babies to have some social time as well outside of their families.

We came twice per week to sing songs, some new and some that the moms already knew, sing rhymes and tell stories. On Mondays we would do the program in French and on Tuesdays it was done in English. Sometimes when there weren't many participants online, we had discussions on how they, as well as the little ones, were doing and feeling.

Our Mother Goose program was actually called "Rhythm, Rhymes and Storytime" or



"Rhythmes, comptines et histoire".

We have participants that came from all over our district and even some that were from out of town so we got to meet and reach out to many families near and far.

We have some families that have followed our program since the beginning of COVID up until now.

When we met them, the little ones were only a few months old and now they are busy little toddlers but because they were there from the start, when it came time to move from virtual to in-person again, we weren't strangers to them. Even with our masks on, they recognized our voices from us singing online with them.

Thank you to the Mother Goose Program for giving us the tools to be able to deliver this program to our families during this very difficult time. ♦
