- learn and retain a repertoire of rhymes, songs and stories
- enjoy strengthened bonding

These skills, pleasures and insights are taken home and shared with older children, grandparents, and other parents. The whole family benefits!

The Parent-Child Mother Goose program is preventative in nature, and provides community service agencies with a clearly developed program that is responsive to community needs.

The program is committed to inclusive services that provide a climate of mutual respect and understanding. We welcome diverse cultures, languages, family situations, sexual orientations, and physical and mental abilities.

We hosted two events this past year which brought people from around the world together. The Moon is Round event, was held in February and celebrated 20 years of the National Council of the P-CMGP with many past NC members in attendance. This year we also surveyed members (facilitators and trainers) to see how the National Council can best support them in the future. We will continue our fundraising efforts to support our administrator and all she does for the P-CMGPs. We will renew our efforts to provide support to our P-CMGP facilitators, trainers and members while continuing to strengthen relationships with partner agencies, and diversify our representation across the country.

# **Program and Training Committee Report**

The Program and Training Committee is a committee of the National Council that focuses on all aspects of our program and training guidelines, development, and policy. It has been a full year of activity from around the country.

In January 2022 we held the sixth annual meeting for P-CMGP teacher trainers, over two different days and times to accommodate as many trainers as possible via Zoom. We thoroughly enjoyed being able to put faces to names and vice versa.

Questions posed were: This year we have continued to offer virtual teacher training workshops. Please let us know what is working well for you, and/or are there barriers, questions or concerns? How can we support you? Would you like to see virtual training sessions be an option?

There was a lot of discussion and comments regarding the positives and challenges of virtual teacher training. The positives included the opportunity to have participants from all over Canada in the same group, the cost saved due to not needing to travel and the luxury of being able to be at home for the training sessions. The challenges included the missed opportunity for physical connection and learning material together in person. There is such power and joy that comes from experiencing the materials together.

The committee would like to extend our sincerest gratitude to all those that attended these meetings and for all the reflection that occurred.

Much of 2022 has been spent updating Teacher Training Workshop (TTW) Level 1 materials to make them more user friendly, accessible online and current. We have finalized the loose-leaf forms, the yellow booklet and are in the final stages of the green lyric booklet and bibliography. Thank you to the Diversity Committee for your thoughtful feedback regarding the lyric booklet.

In addition, an ongoing effort to translate documents from these materials into French continued. A huge thank-you to Marie-Line Therriault for contributing her skills as a volunteer translator during 2021-22, and her commitment to this project. Marie-Line also developed and sustained our online Francophone workshops this year.

2022 was a busy year for welcoming 3 new TTW Level 1 Workshop Facilitators. Guita Movallali, ran the PCMG programs for deaf and hard of hearing children and their families in Iran for 10 years. We are fortunate that she moved to Toronto last year and is now contributing her skills, energy and enthusiasm to programs in Canada. Guita mentored with Ruth Danziger, Lynda Howes and Maria Ordonez. Welcome Guita. Maureen Doll mentored Jo Lukawitski, from the Yukon. Jo is a long-time teacher within the Parent-Child Mother Goose Program® and has a ton of passion and creativity when working with families. Jo will be a huge asset for expanding the program in the Yukon and NWT. Welcome Jo.

Lisa Hurrle, is a well-known name within the Parent-Child Mother Goose Program® community. Lisa has served on the National Council and recently became a TTW Level 1 leader. She mentored with Ginger Mullen, Lynda Howes and Maureen Doll. Lisa lives in Alberta and is also a teacher with the P-CMGP. Welcome Lisa.

In October the P & T committee updated the committee mandate. This had not been done in over 10 years so was ready for a good refresh.

Finally, we are working on establishing a generic Program and Training email address that can be used for inquiries and sending reports to. Stay tuned for the new email.

As always, we continue to respond to questions and communications that come our way from across the country and abroad, relating to Program and/or Training guidelines. We appreciate the opportunity to hear of the positive changes that the Parent-Child Mother Goose Program® makes in the lives of families!

## **Fundraising Committee Report**

We are happy to report that <u>donations</u> have been increasing so far in this fiscal year:

July 2020 – June, 2021 donations: \$3,315

July 2021 – June, 2022 donations: \$1448, notice the Covid hit.

July to October 22, 2022: \$2,147

#### Our Work

We met monthly, developed a fundraising calendar, sent out two fundraising letters in 2021 and three in 2022, explored grant possibilities, Beth attended a fundraising short course through Canada Helps, and we did not give up!

We are exploring other funding options. We applied for an award that had a lovely big cash prize; we did not win.

As previously mentioned, in this year, the National Council held two national events online. They were held primarily for appreciation, for celebration and for providing a knowledge of the history of the program. They were both free events, with donations welcome. We were delighted that both did generate donations!

We now have five monthly donors and matching funds for monthly donations for the first \$1,000. We plan to attempt to find continued matching funding for monthly donations. Our current monthly donations range from \$10 up to \$20 per month. All of you are very welcome to make a monthly donation for any amount from \$3 upwards (Canada Helps low limit). The Donate button on the website takes you to a donation form and a monthly donation option is provided there. As this system of donating grows, we expect it to cover a reliable chunk of our monthly financial needs. Monthly donations are a tremendous bonus for non-profit agencies.

We are looking at potential grant options for the coming year.

We will continue to explore other potential sources of funds. We are very pleased to be in a better financial position at this moment than we were at this time last year, however, we could certainly be doing a lot more if we had more substantial funds.

To wind up, we would like to say that the Parent-Child Mother Goose Program® is a fabulous program! It provides a boost to the relationship between parent and child; there is nothing of more lasting importance in the life of a child than this!


It also boosts abilities and confidence for both parent and child. It reduces isolation for all involved: connections spread beyond the program and many last for years.

## **Diversity Council Report**

We have loved our work! It is so interesting to share perspectives, to learn from each other and to consider what might be helpful to the PCMGP as a whole.

Since the last AGM, we

- finished off the review of the rhymes and songs provided to training workshop participants.
- reviewed the availability in libraries of bibliography resources provided to training workshop participants
- developed a suggested introduction to that collection of rhymes and songs encouraging program teachers to encourage parents to adapt rhymes and songs to the specific needs of their child, the moment and themselves.
- suggested edits to the statement of diversity that had been developed previously by trainers and the Program and Training Committee.

These have been submitted to the Program and Training Committee.

We hope to look now at finding ways for program trainers to share their approaches to encouraging diversity with each other, to build connections amongst Indigenous program teachers and to learn from them, to encourage the diversity of participants in other PCMGP NC committees and the Council itself, and to highlight stories that reflect diversity in PCMGPs.

Most of our work is done in conjunction with the Program and Training Committee.

As we are the most diverse of any of the National committees and the council itself, we have decided that it is important to continue as a committee and to find ways to continue building the inclusive capacity of the program.

## **Event Planning Committee Report**

The Moon is Round event, held over Zoom in February, celebrated 20 years of the National Council of the P-CMGP. Brief presentations were done by previous NC chair persons, Glenna Janzen, Dana Brynelsen, Dianne Blewett, and Marilee Peters as well as by Celia Lottridge. In addition, numerous facilitators from around the country shared both rhymes and songs during the event. Seventy-five people registered to attend. The Once Upon a Time event, was held in October on Zoom and it celebrated 35 years of the P-CMGP and its early history. Special guests were Barry and Dinny Dickson, Celia Lottridge and Katherine Grier. It was a wonderful discussion from all four presenters about how the idea for the program started and how it developed and became the nationwide program that it is today. There were seventy people registered to attend the event, including 3 people from Australia Parent-Child Mother Goose Programs. The event was recorded and edits have been made and it is ready for release. We are currently working on how best to release it. Peter, from Australia, has kindly offered to review the edited video and do a written compilation of the information that was discussed so that we can have it preserved.

Both events were successful in connecting people who had vested interest in the P-CMGP.
